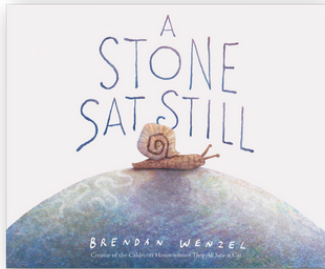
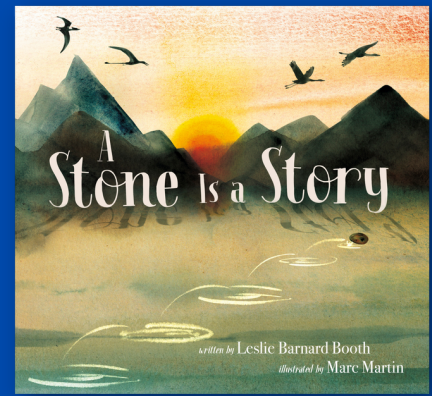


Perfect Pairings for *A Stone Is a Story*

A Stone Sat Still by Brenden Wenzel

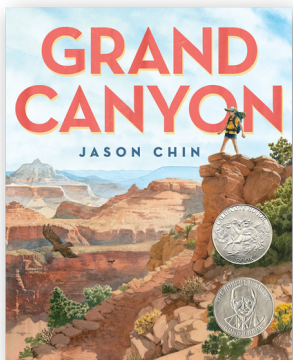
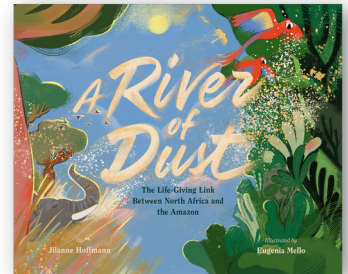

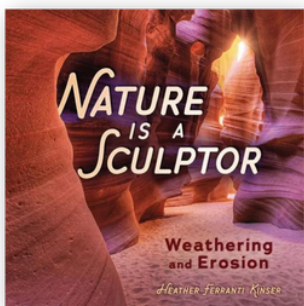
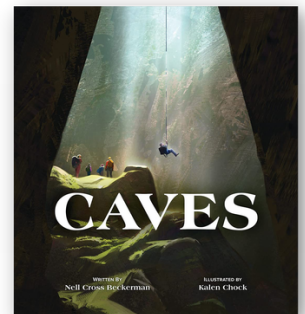


Grand Canyon by Jason Chin
